

# **Walter Sykes**

Rank: Private

Died: 3rd May 1917 (France & Flanders)

2nd/5th Bn., Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment)



#### **Summary**

Walter Sykes family home was Hollin Hall, Upper Hopton where he was raised by his parents Arthur and Ellen Sykes and worked as a wool spinner. He died whilst serving on the Western Front (Battle of Bullecourt) in May 1917 (age 24) and his sacrifice has been remembered at the Arras Memorial in France.

His elder brother Willie died in hospital in November 1918 (age 27) after fighting on the Western Front and his younger brother Herbert survived the war but had to have both of his legs amputated. The youngest brother Joe was wounded in 1917 and hospitalised, also gassed in 1918 and spent time in the Dewsbury War Hospital. He was discharged on the 21 May 1919.



#### Walter's brothers

His elder brother Willie lost his life whilst serving on the Western Front November 1918.

Herbert survived the war but had to have both his legs amputated.

Alan and Ernest were both coal miners and no records could be found about their military service. Ernest was buried at St Johns church Upper Hopton on the 1 April 1929 age 40.

The youngest brother, Joe was born on the 17 July 1898. He enlisted in the 2nd West Yorkshire Regiment (Reg. No. 63556), rank Private. He was wounded in 1917 and hospitalised, also Gassed in 1918 and spent time in the Dewsbury War Hospital. He was discharged on the 21 May 1919. On the 10th February 1934, Joe married Hilda Brewer at St. Pauls Church, Eastthorpe. The marriage certificate states that he was a railway man and still living at Northgate.

# 2nd/5th Battalion Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment) Territorial Force

The 2nd/5th Battalion was formed at Halifax in September 1914 as a home service.

Jan 1917 Mobilised for war and landed in France and engaged in various actions on the Western front including:

- The Operations on the Ancre.
- The German retreat to the Hindenburg Line.
- The first attack on Bullecourt (part of the Arras offensive)
- The German attack on Lagnicourt (part of the Arras offensive).
- The Battle of Bullecourt (part of the flanking operations round Arras).
- The actions on the Hindenburg Line.
- The Cambrai Operations.

Walter lost his life on the 3rd May 1917 which coincides with the Third battle of Scarpe 3 to 4 May or the Battle of Bullecourt 3 to 17 May (Arras Offensive). The Regiment's war diaries below suggest that he was at the Battle of Bullecourt when he lost his life. The war diaries show that the Regiment was at Ecoust when Walter lost his life, Ecoust is 18km south east of Arras and 26km west of Cambrai.

# War Diaries - 2 / 5<sup>th</sup> Duke of Wellington's (West Riding) Regiment 2<sup>nd</sup> May 1917 – MORY

**9 to 12.30** - Interior Economy and preparation for going into the line. Afternoon Coys again went over miniature trench system of BULLECOURT.

**9.15pm** – Batt'n marched to ECOUST (Embankment) where they drew mats for getting over wire, bridges for crossing trenches and bombs. They then formed up on tape line Ref.Map 1:10000 ECOUST ST MIEN U 26 d 99 to U 26 b 71 all was completed by 1.30am and without casualties. Tanks followed the Batt'n down from L'HOMME MOYT to ECOUST.

#### **3<sup>rd</sup> May 1917 – ECOUST**

**3.45am** - Zero hour. At zero hour minus 8 minutes Batt'n moved forward to attack HINDENBERG LINE West of BULLECOURT. A heavy barrage commenced at zero. 'A' Coy reached their objective and held it until 4.00pm when they were counter attacked and bombed out, they retired on to Embankment.

'B', 'C' and 'D' Coys came under heavy shell, rifle and Machine Gun fire and were held up in front of enemy front line trench, small parties holding out in shell holes until after dark when they retired to Embankment. Batt'n suffered heavy casualties. The following officers were Killed Capt and Adj T.BENTLEY, LIEUT D.WALKER. Missing believed killed 2/Lieut Jacobs. Missing Capt G Glover, LIEUT G Ridley MC. 2/Lieut E.T.Sykes. 2/Lieut Heaton, 2/Lieut's Darwent and Hutton. Wounded Capt W Shaw. 2/Lieut's Fisher and Simmonds. Shell Shock Lieut K.C.Feather and Capt Walker J. N.P.O. plus other men killed 2, missing 123, wounded 275.

**8.00pm** – Six posts were put out in W 26 B & D under Capt Goodall. Lieut Haigh went out with stretcher bearers to bring in wounded.

#### 4th May 1917 - ECOUST

Batt'n still holding the line, wounded dribbled in all day, shelling was heavy. At night Batt'n were relieved by 2/6<sup>th</sup> and 2/7<sup>th</sup> Duke of Wellingtons and marched back by companies to MORY. Cops into camp. During relief there were no casualties, Arrived MORY Cops about 2.30am next day.

#### 5<sup>th</sup> May 1917 – MORY Cops

Morning. Batt'n rested and moved camp across MORY – St LEDGER Rd. Afternoon took steps to reorganise.


**7.00pm** Draft of 5 officers arrived. Consisting of Lieut's E.Ainley and Moxon C, 2/Lieut's G.Bodkin, Black and A.S.Jack.

#### The Battle of Bullecourt 3rd May 1917

The total failure of General Nivelle on Chemin des Dames Ridge led the French Army to call for a renewed British offensive at Arras, Despite the hopeless nature of the situation. The Australians of the 1st ANZAC launched a new assault at Bullecourt in the company of the British 62nd Division. The second Battle of Bullecourt began at 3.45am on the 3rd May with eight successive waves of infantry, this time supported by artillery fire. The Australians broke through the partially destroyed barbed wire entanglements, passing many of their comrades killed the month before and still lying in the mud. The 5th Brigade, cut to pieces by machine gun fire, was forced to withdraw before crossing the barbed wire and this brought to a halt the following waves of infantry. A few young officers intervened to get men moving forward again but by the end of the day no real gain had been made and the second Battle of Bullecourt deteriorated into a tragic repetition of the first. Only the survivors of the 6th Brigade managed to take 400 metres of the German front and press on to the second line, receiving reinforcements under the cover of night.



#### **Arras Memorial**

The Arras Memorial commemorates 34,795 servicemen from the United Kingdom, South Africa and New Zealand who died from the spring of 1916 until 7<sup>th</sup> August 1918, and who have no known grave. Most of the casualties commemorated here were killed during the Allied offensive during the Battles of Arras in April and May 1917 and during the German attack on the Allied Front from 21<sup>st</sup> March 1918.

Private Arthur Fisher has been in Hospital with a troublesome skin trouble, due to the food which the advance from the trenches involved; but he writes happily from a Base Hospital in France.

Privates Walter Sykes and Arthur Loader, both of Northgate, are reported missing, and it is believed that they are Prisoners of War, but definite news of this is slow in coming to hand. Our respectful sympathy is extended to the families of these two, and may they soon get news.
