

Gilbert Hill

Rank: Lance Corporal

Killed in Action: 24th April 1918 (France & Flanders)

6th Bn. Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry



Summary

Gilbert Hill's family home was Middlegate, Hightown, Liversedge where he lived with his parents James Henry Laws Stocks and Elizabeth Hill. His previous family home was Northrop, Mirfield and before that his mother lived at Cockley Hill.

His ocupation was as a Teamer for an Ironmonger.

Gilbert is not commemorated on the St John's Church memorial but his family had strong links with Upper Hopton and his parents and grandparents all have graves in St John's churchyard. His father's grave (James Henry Law Stocks) has a commemoration to his son Gilbert Hill, in St John's churchyard Upper Hopton

Gilbert was killed in action in April 1918 (age 22) whilst serving on the Western Front with the Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry.

Gilbert is remembered at the Pozieres Memorial, Somme, France. The POZIERES MEMORIAL relates to the period of crisis in March and April 1918 when the Allied Fifth Army was driven back by overwhelming German numbers across the former Somme battlefields, and the months that followed before the Advance to Victory, which began on 8th August 1918.

Stocks Family

James Stocks of Hopton Fold, marries Betsy Peace of Kirkheaton on the 26 Dec 1844. This is James Law stocks grandfather who he later lives with.

Thomas Stocks (Dyer later Malster age 23) marries Harriet Wrathmall (22) on 10 April 1869 and live at Cockley Hill.

Thomas & Harriet have a son James Henry Law Stocks born 28 May 1869 and baptised at Upper Hopton Church. They also have a daughter Lily and son George Peace. George was born 24 Jan 1876 and Baptised in Upper Hopton Church.

25 Jan 1904 George Peace (31) Stocks of Cockley Hill marries Ruth Ann Walker (29) of Kirkheaton at Kirkheaton church.

On the 1881 & 1891 census James Law Stocks was living with his Grandfather (James Stocks) at Cockley Hill, two doors away from Elizabeth Hill. In 1881 his mother and father were living next door to James Law with Lily and George Peace. In 1891 his mother Harriet was a widow and living in Hopton Fold with Lily and George Peace.

James Law's parents:

Thomas Stocks dies in 22 Dec 1890 age 45.
Harriet dies 18 Dec 1905 age 59 they also had four children who died in infancy. See gravestone below.

James Laws Grandparents:

Betsy Stocks died 13 March 1891 age 65? and James 27 April 1891 age 68. See gravestone below.

Hill Family

Joshua Hill was Baptised Joshua Broadbent Hill in Kirkheaton church on the 4th June 1865. Joshua was born on 5th March 1865, Father Dick Alan (weaver), mother Ruth

Joshua Hill (Coal Miner age 20) marries Elizabeth Lee (19) On the 1 Jan 1885 in Kirkheaton

Joshua & Elizabeth Hill live at Cockley Hill and have three children, Lucy, Arthur Hedrick and Lewis

James William Hill is born 24 June 1891 (Baptised 29 Sept 1891 at Upper Hopton Church born Cockley Hill) Father Joshua Hill and mother Elizabeth Hill

14 Sept 1897 Arthur Hedrick Hill dies at the age of 10 years (living at Jidroyd Kirkheaton) and is buried at Kirkheaton Chuch

Elizabeth Hill leaves Joshua Hill taking James William but leaving her two remaining children Lucy and Lewis with Joshua. Date not known.

1901 census shows that Joshua Hill is living with his two remaining children Lucy and Lewis, with a housekeeper Elizabeth Elliss and boarder Joseph Bray.

1911 census shows that Joshua Hill is living with his son Lewis and now married daughter Lucy, her husband John William Priestley (married July 1905) and their three daughters age 5,3 and 1.

James Law Stocks and Elizabeth Hill

James Willie is taken with his mother to live with James Henry Law Stocks but she leaves Lucy and Lewis behand with Joshua Hill. (Do not know the exact date when Elizabeth leaves Joshua)

The 1901 census shows that James Henry Law Stocks and Elizabeth Hill (housekeeper) live together at Dunbottle Lane, Northorpe.

James Henry Law & Elizabeth have two sons Gilbert Hill and Albyn Hill, both are baptised in Mirfield and their birthplace given as Northorpe. The fathers name of Law is crossed out in the baptism register for Gilbert and counter signed by the vicar. Gilbert's surname is simply Hill whereas Albyn's birth registration shows his surname as Stocks Hill.

Elizabeth Hill dies in 1903. Sons James William is 11, Gilbert 7 and Albyn is 5.

On the 10 Jan 1904 James Law Stocks (age 35) marries Bertha Ann Hincliffe (32) in Battyford. A 1901 census shows that Bertha Hincliffe was a widow and a housekeeper for William Burton at Wombwell near Barnsley.

The 1911 census shows the following living at Middlegate, Hightown, Liversedge: James Henry Stocks, Bertha Ann Stocks, James William Hill, Gilbert Hill, Bertha Hincliffe (Bertha Ann's daughter born in Barnsley) and Albyn Hill.

8 Nov 1913 James William Hill (age 22) marries Rose Ann Hammond (20). On the marriage certificate James's father is shown as Joshua Hill.

Gilbert Hill was killed in action in France and Flanders on the 24 April 1918 age 22 (Poziers Memorial) when serving with the 6th Bn. Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry.

Albyn Hill dies on 28 Feb 1925 age 28 and is buried in Upper Hopton. In his will Albyn leaves £110 to George Peace Stocks who is the brother of his father James Henry Law Stocks.

James Henry Stocks dies age 53 (living in Roberttown) and is buried 30 Jan 1923 in Upper Hopton cemetery. Bertha Henry Stocks and Albyn Hill are also buried in Upper Hopton Cemetery with a commemoration on the gravestone for Gilbert Hill who dies in France in 1918.







Gilbert Hill

6th (Service) Battalion - Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry

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The 6th (Service) Battalion, Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry was raised at Pontefract on the 12th of August 1914 as part of Kitchener's First New Army and joined 43rd Brigade in 14th (Light) Division. They trained at Woking, moving to Witley in November 1914 for the winter, then moving to Aldershot in February 1915 for final training.

They proceeded to France on the 21st of May 1915 landing at Boulogne. They fought in the The Action of Hooge, being the first division to be attacked by flamethrowers. They were in action in The Second Attack on Bellewaarde. In 1916 they were on the Somme seeing action in The Battle of Delville Wood and The Battle of Flers-Courcelette.

In 1917 they fought in The German retreat to the Hindenburg Line, The First and Third Battle of the Scarpe at Arras, The Battle of Langemark and The First and Second Battle of Passchendaele. On the 19th of February 1918 the 6th KOYLI were disbanded in France as the army was reorganised.

Cap Badge

The badge of the KOYLI is unique amongst English light infantry regiments as the horn is of the 'French' type (with a twist). The origins of this are obscure. It appears to have been adopted after Waterloo, however before this the 105th had an 'English' style Bugle horn with a loop. In its centre is the White Rose of York, linking to the regiment's home in Yorkshire. Unusual amongst British Army regiments, the badge lacks a crown. It was also the smallest cap badge used in the British Army.

Pozieres Memorial

The POZIERES MEMORIAL relates to the period of crisis in March and April 1918 when the Allied Fifth Army was driven back by overwhelming numbers across the former Somme battlefields, and the months that followed before the Advance to Victory, which began on 8 August 1918.

The Memorial commemorates over 14,000 casualties of the United Kingdom and 300 of the South African Forces who have no known grave and who died on the Somme from 21 March to 7 August 1918.

The memorial encloses POZIERES BRITISH CEMETERY, Plot II of which contains original burials of 1916, 1917 and 1918, carried out by fighting units and field ambulances. The remaining plots were made after the Armistice when graves were brought in from the battlefields immediately surrounding the cemetery, the majority of them of soldiers who died in the Autumn of 1916 during the latter stages of the Battle of the Somme, but a few represent the fighting in August 1918.


